The Clerk-Treasurer processes the receipts and expenditures of all City money; prescribes the payroll for the City; determines the manner in which vendors, officers and employees are paid; manages the City financial accounts; makes all investments on behalf of the City; prepares the budget estimates of revenue, financial statements and the proposed tax rate; manages all City records; serves as the Clerk of the City Council and Board of Public Works and Safety by preparing agendas, recording proceedings and maintaining custody of records.







Permit Fees Collected











Average Permit Values: Single Family Homes






TOTAL CONSTRUCTION COST

Total Construction Cost: Single Family Homes




Total Construction Cost: Commercial




BUILDING DATA SUMMARY: COMMERCIAL



Permits Issued: Commercial



TOTAL COMBINED CONSTRUCTION VALUE






BOARD OF ZONING APPEALS (BZA)

It is established to remedy situations in which the terms of the Zoning Ordinance impose a specific hardship on a unique parcel within the City of Franklin.



The City of Franklin exercises zoning jurisdiction in adjacent territory included in what was once a two mile extraterritorial "buffer zone." The "buffer zone" allows the City of Franklin to exercise zoning authority outside the corporate city limits, influencing growth and development in areas where the City may grow in the future. The City has not expanded its extraterritorial jurisdiction since its inception. The buffer zone has decreased in size as property in this area has been annexed into the city limits over the years.

CITY OF FRANKLIN ACQUISITION PROJECT



The City of Franklin experienced a Presidential Disaster Declaration as a result of flooding that began on June 7, 2008. A total of 259 residential structures located within the Special Flood Hazard Area were assessed for damages due to this flooding. Flooding of these structures was caused from the waters breaching the banks of Young's Creek and Hurricane Creek that flow through the City of Franklin. The City identified concentrated areas that incurred substantial damage and identified a total of 75 homes to acquire in order to alleviate further losses to the owners and the community with future flooding.

Among the areas affected included homes in the West South Street area, East Jefferson Street area, and North Forsythe area. These homes are located in areas adjacent to existing City properties which are in the floodway and floodplain. Due to their close proximity to these open areas, the acquisition of these homes lends itself to readily expanding public spaces for the enjoyment and benefit of the community as a whole while alleviating the concern of future damages to the homes and health of the homeowners should these structures remain.

The City of Franklin submitted an application for an Acquisition Grant through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) in order to acquire and demolish the homes. The City was awarded \$4,920,291 by FEMA. In addition to obtaining the Acquisition Grant through FEMA, the City of Franklin obtained a \$1.6 million grant through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program to assist with the 25% local match.

Nine of the 75 properties have been removed from consideration for various reasons which leaves a total of 66 homes in the project. By the end of 2011, the City had acquired 58 of the homes in the Acquisition Project. Demolition of the structures was also being financed by use of National Emergency Grant (NEG) funds. A total of 57 residential structures and their accessory buildings had been completely removed from the properties in 2011 in accordance with the HMGP and CDBG regulations. These properties have been filled, graded, and seeded.

A volunteer committee (Flood Area Reuse Committee) was established to solicit public input on the future use of the areas acquired through the Acquisition Project and provide recommendation to the Park Board. This committee was comprised of a number of citizens with experience in many different backgrounds. Input from the public was sought through the committee's presence at the Fourth Friday events, Smoke on the Square, Fall Festival and through a public meeting. The committee's findings were forwarded to the Park Board during a public meeting held November 15, 2011.
